
Our History


Glace Bay (Scottish Gaelic: Glasbaidh) is a community in the eastern part of the Cape Breton Regional Municipality. First settled in 1785 once an independently incorporated town (1901–1995), the municipal government in Glace Bay was dissolved and the community has been amalgamated into the larger regional municipality. Prior to amalgamation, Glace Bay had been the province's fourth largest urban area and was the largest town in Nova Scotia (in population) and during the 1940s was recognized as the largest populated town in Canada.

The growth and development of Glace Bay is closely linked to the coal mining industry. Glace Bay was once a coal mining community and at its high point had eleven mines operational, employed over 10,000, and was responsible for 40% of Canada's coal production. The last coal mine was closed in 1984 having a huge economic impact on the community. Today the Miners Museum in Glace Bay provides an educational experience to tourist, residents and youth on the life of a miner underground.

Fishing has been a prominent industry in the town since the early 1900s. Glace Bay was once home to a very busy commercial fishing industry. Glace Bay's natural protected harbour provided employment for hundreds of fishers and in fish processing. Depletion of fish stocks in the late 1980s and early 1990s, however, led to a downturn in the industry. Recently there has been a resurgence in the fishing industry.

Glace Bay takes great pride in its heritage, and boasts a thriving art scene that is reflective of its diverse cultural history. We have a vibrant entertainment scene where performances of theatre, music, and dance occur regularly. Music and art enrich our community by connecting people through the power of music. Glace Bay is home to the ninety year old Savoy Theatre, Cape Bretons entertainment and cultural showcase.






BayItForward

With the closure of our mining industry in 1984 and the downturn in the fishery resulting in the loss of thousands of jobs, Glace Bay's population declined and our Business Community struggled. BayItForward was created in 2016 and identified the need to bring our community together for positive change. Community gatherings were organized, surveys were conducted with an overwhelming response that the residents wanted to become engaged, wanted to be part of implementing change. Bayitforward has done tremendous work in identifying what matters to Glace Bay, engaging the community and making sure we're maximizing our potential.

BayItForward identified our community assets and strengths, emphasizing on what we have in order to improve community life. Glace Bay is home to three amazing museums; Miners Museum, Old Town Hall and Marconi National Historic Site. Other notable assets are our Historic Savoy Theatre, working harbour, ocean shore line and of course our people. With an increase in tourism, the Miners Museum is now the number one destination for Cruise Ship passengers with yearly visitors surpassing 16,000.

Glace Bay's successes are being noticed across the country. Toronto Globe and Mail had a reporter visit for a story, Rogers Hometown Hockey celebrated in Glace Bay and recently the Community Foundation of Nova Scotia and RBC identified BayItForward with a grant to work with youth groups within the community.



Engaging the community is a top priority. Since our inception we have organized many community events. All were very well attended and very successful. In 2017, for the first time since 1984, there was a Xmas light-up in our downtown core. Thousands attended. Same result in 2018.

Undercurrent Youth Centre

The Undercurrent Youth Centre has been in operation for 8 years offering youth space for music, mentorship, recreation including floor hockey, basketball, skateboarding, dance fitness, indoor rock climbing slack lining, life skills and many other games and programs. Currently Undercurrent has in excess of 400 youth utilize their facility each week.

Along with our regular weekly programs, Undercurrent hosts many extra kid, youth, and family events. Our summer programs include weekly hike / adventure days across Cape Breton, sports programs, youth camps, and other recreation opportunities.

Undercurrent Youth Centre, Glace Bay Food Bank and Glace Bay Citizen Service League partner each summer for a summer breakfast program as a continuation of the School Program while school is closed for the summer.

Town House

Town House believes in community engagement, forging partnerships and consultation. We aim to involve community members in our programs and activities. We seek to include a variety stakeholders such as other non-profit organizations, faith groups, health and mental health organizations, schools and post secondary institutions, businesses, service clubs, senior's groups, and politicians.

Established in 1967, Glace Bay Citizens Service League is a volunteer based non-profit, charitable organization which offers programs that improve the quality of life of the community of Glace Bay, Nova Scotia, Canada, and surrounding areas, in response to needs identified by residents.

Town House presents several programs throughout the year. Preschool, Summer Day Camp, March Break Program, March Break Camp, The Back Pack Program, Senior Brunch Program, Senior Contact Program, Meals on Wheels, Community Friends and a Clothing Depot.

Town House offers a wide variety of courses to the community and is open to requests for new courses. The following courses are scheduled regularly and registrations are accepted on an ongoing basis: Safe Boating Course, Babysitting Course, First Aid/CPR, Defensive Driving Course and Tai Chi for Arthritis.

Cape Breton Environmental Association

Cape Breton Environmental Association's mission is to spread environmental awareness through participation and education.

Cape Breton Environmental Association (CBEA) is a volunteer community-based organization. Founded in 2017. Its original mission was to help curve Cape Breton's ongoing illegal dumping issue but has since grown into a diverse organization which offers environmental awareness through education and participation. Since its establishment CBEA has been responsible for a variety of community based environmental initiatives all made possible by passionate volunteers.

Glace Bay Community Commons

The Community Commons located at South Street Ball Park opened in 2018. A playground, splash pad and basketball court are available for the children's entertainment. The park is now open seven days a week from 10 a.m. to 7 p.m, but it can be accessed before and after those times. On warm days there will be over 100 children playing in the park.

Glace Bay Festival Society

Bay Days Summer Festival has been celebrating summer in Glace Bay for over 25 years. For a week each summer there is a parade, music, vendors markets, antique car shows, family day, youth events and games ending with one of Cape Breton largest fireworks displays. Thousands attend the festivities.

The last couple of years Bay Days has integrated our International Students into our program with their traditional song and dance. With today's technology they are able to broadcast their performances in real time to their family and friends at home.

Vince Ryan Memorial Hockey Tournament

The tournament sprouted from the established Devco Old-timers Hockey League. The Devco League, formed in 1983, began with just 4 teams. Its purpose was to give coal miners aged 35 and older a chance to get together on Sunday evening to play some hockey. In 1989, they decided to hold a tournament to benefit the local community and the Vince Ryan Tournament was born. Although Devco is now defunct, the League still exists and Devco teams continue to participate in the tournament every year

Every year, approximately 160 teams from across Canada and the United States and recently a team from the Netherlands, bringing thousands of players to 10 rinks across the Cape Breton Regional Municipality (CBRM) in Nova Scotia. Scholarships are provided to all Cape Breton High Schools.

Conclusion

Glace Bay, after many year's of population decline and businesses struggling, is beginning to see change. Invigorated by BayItForward, Glace Bay is seeing a resurgence in Community Pride and interest from new businesses start-ups and expansions.
