## About We'koqma'q

The community of We'koqma'q First Nation is approximately forty-four (44) kilometers north of the Canso Causeway and one-hundred and fifteen (115) kilometers south of Industrial Cape Breton. Its population consists of 1,043 residents. It is bordered by the Bras D'or Lake and a mountainous range known as Skye Mountain. We'koqma'q itself is comprised of 828.5 hectares of land. The Mi'kmaq were the first peoples to populate the shores of the lake. The area is rich in hunting and fishing grounds the landscape is tranquil and picturesque.

We'koqma'q First Nation is a **progressive community on the rise**. For the past decade, Chief and Council, along with the management team, have been focused on building a self-sustaining economy for their community members. A diverse portfolio of enterprises has resulted in significant and strategic investments in community infrastructure and hundreds of sustainable employment opportunities for community members and beyond.

Throughout this last decade of change, We'koqma'q Chief and Council have prioritized the economic, social and health needs of their community but have also invested in building strong relationships outside of the community in terms of business, recreation, and education opportunities to further enhance the quality of life and create optimal opportunities for all their community members.

The health and wellness of We'koqma'q extends far beyond physical health. We'koqma'q have taken a holistic approach to improving the quality of life for their entire community – spiritual, mental and physical – while also investing in essential infrastructure, like housing, water, sewer, the health centre and more. Access to specialized healthcare has also changed the health of We'koqma'q. With some of the best wait times in the province for mental health support, and exceptional day-to-day care, We'koqma'q is truly becoming Provincial leaders of change and development in this field.

One of the most promising and profitable lines of business is We'koqma'q commercial fisheries and aquaculture divisions. In just 10 years, We'koqma'q First Nation have built a fully integrated trout aquaculture business that consists of a hatchery,farm, and processing plant. We'koqma'q seafood products are sold by the largest retailers in our Atlantic region and are chosen for their superior quality.

Aside from creating hundreds of new jobs, We'koqma'q has continued to re-invest these revenues into their community for housing and other necessary infrastructure, such as roads, water, sewer, healthcare and resources for their beloved elders and youth. Furthermore, we have provided training opportunities for community members that allow them to build careers within the community, for the community. A prime example would be 4 members from We'koqma'q contracting who were sent to get training on solar panel installation. This allows our community to become more environmentally efficient as we grow.

The past ten years have been a time of positive and prosperous transformation for We'koqma'q. As a community, they've worked hard to build a self-sustaining economy that has created robust employment opportunities in the community of We'koqma'q, all while staying true to their culture and demonstrating their incredible strength and resilience.



Remembering their history, carrying-on their traditions, celebrating their culture and learning to build your best future, are the pillars in which We'kogma'g has and will continue to grow. Our community has just gone through one of the most challenging moments in our history. The Covid-19 pandemic required our communitymembers to stay diligent, focused, committed, and safe. We required everyone to come together as a community to protect one another and to follow all health and safety protocols. We are proud to say that once again, We'kogma'g Community has been incredible and supportive throughout this Pandemic.

We have helped one another, remained safe and have successfully vaccinated 92% of our community as of July 2021. Most recently, we received a letter of recognition from the Province of Nova Scotia for our hard work and commitment to keeping everyone safe and protected.

Remembering our history, carrying-on our traditions, celebrating our culture, and learning to build your best future, are the pillars in how we support the youth in our community. **Our investments in educational and recreational resources have brightened our community**. We are extremely proud of the unique and holistic education system that we have built here in We'koqma'q.

For the newest members of our community, our daycare provides a safe, inclusive environment for our children to have a stimulating learning and childcare experience. Our school is also recognized as a leader in Canada for the unique and specialized support we provide to students with varying needs. Education extends far beyond the classroom.

Community-based programs like the **Eagle Youth Group**, **Youth Camps**and **Camp Rod** further connect our children to our cultural roots, while teaching them the life skills needed to keep them on the right path. Our mental health services and health centre provides around the clock support for our youth in greatest need.

We are proud to run a Youth Program each summer where the Youth in our community work directly with our Elders. This program is facilitated throughout Band with a goal of having our Youth provide services such as complimentary lawn mowing services, help around their home, etc. to help create the necessary mentorship and learning that is so important for our community.

## Sustainability and Faith

Sustainably is a priority for us as we move into 2021-2022 and respecting the environment has been a core pillar of our foundation and community belief since the beginning. As a band, we are working towards a community-wide solar plan, we have created a commitment to go green as much as we can as a community, and we host community clean-ups with a great turn out. Our new buildings will be built with sustainable application that will exceed requirements. As a community, we have many green spaces and stunning places to nature our environment such as our pristine Skye River Trail. This Trail is an attraction for community members, tourists, neighbouring communities and more. We offer regular community events, tours through our medicine gardens and many locals enjoy fishing and walking these trails.





Faith-Based practice and groups remain very strong in our community. Each year we host community sacraments that bring all community members together for baptism celebrations, anniversaries, weddings, funerals and more. Our faith is extremely strong and something that we take very serious as a community. We have mass/church involvement at the school for some special events such as ash Wednesday, remembrance day, etc.

## **Investing for the Future**

A pillar of our community, our school is a special place for children to learn their history and roots, while gaining the education and support needed to build their future.

- Daycare expanded to care for up to 23 children to meet the growing needs of our community

## **Community United**

This past year has been incredibly challenging for Mi'kmaq communities across Nova Scotia and Indigenous across Canada. As we mourn and remember the children who have not returned home from residential schools, we're re-living hurtful truths from our pasts, while carving a new path for our future. Despite this pain, we've continued to progress.

Together, we're showing the world that We'koqma'q is in control of our own future. This is a powerful statement and something that should make everyone in our community very proud.

One of the proudest moments for us as a community was when we came together to honour the children who never returned home. A community vigil was held at our school where we brought 215 children's shoes to honour all children.









During this time in June of 2021, a local We'koqma'q artist and teacher, Whitney Gould felt compelled to share her feelings throughout a piece of art that was released both Nationally and Internationally. The artwork, titled, "They Found Us" depicts the silhouettes of two children, one leaning in to whisper into the ear of the other, with a bald eagle soaring high amid a vivid yellow and orange sunset.

Gould, a substitute teacher from We'koqma'q First Nation, couldn't help thinking about her grandmother, Pauline Gould, a residential school survivor who passed away in 1992, as she saw the news of the children's bodies found in British Columbia. "I kept thinking to myself, if she didn't come home, I wouldn't be here."



This piece of art is powerful, meaningful and a true representation of everything we are as a community and a sense of place. Our spirit is so strong, determined, and united as one community – one We'kogma'q

By building our own businesses and through effective governance of our Band, we're positioned for significant economic growth, which has already resulted in improved social support for our community –

## Proud Moments of 2020-2021



**We'koqma'qs first Food Bank** opened in July 2021. In our first week opened, we were able to help 28 families and that number has grown ever since.



We are proud to have grown our Housing Department and to have awarded **20 new homes** to members of our community for 2021-2022. We also received an additional 12 new housing units for rapid housing and receive support from Health Canada for 4 new homes that are being used as Covid-19 isolation home for community members to be able to safely return home and have a place to safely stay.
